Born in Texas, Rhonda Lacy cut her teeth on Republican politics as a youngster in the

¹ '50s and '60s in Ohio, Oklahoma and Texas, also campaigning for her mother's County Chair race in Tulsa, Oklahoma, her father's Railroad Commission race in Texas, her nephew's victorious 60/40% win for City Council race in Midland and coaching his race for Congress in Tx 11, Rhonda has literally worked in hundreds of campaigns block-walking, running phone banks, doing mail-outs all over the state of Texas [and initially Oklahoma] and believes strongly in the Mighty Three for Republicans of 1) Recruit Republicans, 2) Support and Elect Republicans, 3) Share the good conservative Republican message. Rhonda received at the 2015 TFRW Convention the Texas Award for Most Volunteer Hours in a two-year cycle with over 6,500 hours during 2014-2015.

In 2021, after spending 20 months on the road in Texas connecting with almost half of Texas' 254 counties, two sets of tires and developing the TFRW Victory 2020 program, Rhonda received **Governor Greg Abbott's Steve Munisteri Volunteer of the Year award for 2021** at the December SREC meeting. Rhonda's team of initially 700 working with RPTs Political Director Mitch Carney and the Volunteer Engagement Project not only registered more than 212,000 new Republicans, but through 15 Strike Force teams helped to hold the Texas State House and Congressional seats. The end of December 2020, Rhonda led 60 Texans to 'Strike Force' in Georgia for two much-needed U.S. Senate seats. In 2022, Rhonda's team recruited 2,500 volunteers to register another 169,000 Republicans in 4 months, led Strike Forces in Ft. Worth, San Antonio and again in Georgia's Senate run-off race.

Rhonda has served in several capacities on the TFRW Board from TFRW VP Programs, Chaplain, Prayer Chairman to Education Chair, committees on legislation, awards, special events, membership, outreach, Belles and Boots, and TFRW VP of Membership where she worked to increase membership from 9,000 to 11,000 women statewide, making it the largest such organization in the nation. She is responsible for sharing TLAs "Now You Are 18 Booklet" High School Senior program in Texas which has now spread to other states. Serving 3 terms as President of Midland County Republican Women, her club reached largest in the nation with 604 members. Rhonda promoted the "Republicans Believe In" business card to women throughout the nation. She served in the southern part of Senatorial District 31 as SREC, but also loves her Republicans 'up north' in the Panhandle! At the Republican Party of Texas, Rhonda served on the Rules, Auxiliaries, New Leaders on the Rise and Engagement committees and as Prayer Chairman for both the Party and TFRW sending out much-needed prayer requests and updates on the Republican family. Working on the 'Cruz for President Strike Force' in Iowa, she quickly made the move to Trump for President in June of 2016, traveling all over the state of Texas and into 4 of the 13 Battleground states for Trump. Pittsburgh was her pride and joy for Allegheny County, PA votes putting Mr. Trump over the top electorally. In December of that year, Rhonda appointed her protégé Grace Jones as point to lead 30 Texans into Louisiana for their Congressional run-off. Rhonda made the strategic decision to blockwalk Shreveport rather than Bossier City, flipping Shreveport from D to R to elect now U.S. Speaker of the House, Mike Johnson, to his Congressional seat. In 2018, she facilitated Ted Cruz for Senate signs into 67 towns and communities throughout west and south Texas.

Besides politics, Rhonda has served on the Missions Committee at First Baptist Midland, working in more than ten countries and several states, served on the board of the Ruth School in Bucharest, Romania where she once smuggled in Bibles before the fall of communism and currently sings with the Sonshiners Christian group and is a mentor in the GAP department at First Baptist with young singles moving into Midland, many of whom she taught previously during her 30 years as a kindergarten teacher before retiring to become a full-time Republican Rebel. Currently, Rhonda is serving with the Mayflower Church congregation's resettlement to west Texas from their escape of communism in China. She works actively to advocate for them in the workplace, education, and health services. A graduate of Baylor University and also attending Texas Tech University, she loves both her Bears and Raiders. Rhonda loves her country, its God-ordained Constitution, works tirelessly to educate her citizens as how to save this nation for those who come behind us and prays without ceasing for America's return to God and Constitution.

VOTER REGISTRATION IN TEXAS

Texas law requires voters to register by the 30th day before the election. The voter deadline for the March 5th primary was February 5th. That election is over, but we have a Texas run-off election on May 28th. Nearly every county in Texas has a runoff election on May 28th and Ector County has 3 items on this runoff. You must be registered to vote by April 28th for this election.

To be eligible to vote in Odessa, Texas you must: Be a U.S Citizen. Be a resident of the county; (you may register at 17 years & 10 months); Not a convicted felon (unless a person's sentence is completed, including any probation or parole); Not declared mentally incapacitated by a court of law.

The website for the Secretary of State www:sos.state.tx.us./election can be very helpful as it has links for you to register to vote. You can request an application on this link that will be mailed to you to be completed. Voter registrations are available at your local election office located in the Ector County Annex Building. Voter Registrations application is also available at many post offices. Several of our ECRW ladies are voter registration deputies which mean they have all the papers to register a voter and are responsible for its delivery to election office. Donna Kelm, Rachel Minor and Judy Calloway are ladies that are voter deputies.

Texas Federation of Republican Women makes Voter Registration a priority thru out the state with their Voter Engagement Program known as VEP. Mary Hefferman is chair of this huge project that uses Red Dialer as a project for clubs to register voters. It is the goal of this program for each caller to do 200 calls a week and is super simple. Let us know if interested in more details.

More specifically:

- Paid hours count if not your primary source of income.
- Work done for campaigns, including all work for mailings, preparing signs, telephoning, door knocking, poll work, talking to people about the elections.
- Hours spent at special events, including organizing, planning, and clean-up.
- Any hours spent as a precinct chair or assisting a chair.
- Political candidates can count <u>all</u> campaign hours.
- Time spent voting, including travel time.
- Any calls of a political nature or for club activities, including calls made to elected officials, calls made for campaigns, calls in support or opposition to legislation.
- Any travel time.

This is a lot of information and can be confusing. I will be expounding on the do's and do not's in the future. In the meantime, text me (432.528.2674) or email me <u>bnormanio@sbcglobal.net</u> if you have questions. Please do not decide to participate because it may be confusing or you think it will be too time-consuming.

Again, your hourly report is a <u>best-you-can</u>, <u>honest accounting</u>. For you who have spent so many hours these last few months campaigning and working for your candidates, just do an honest estimate of the time spent. Do not be modest. Some of you spend hundreds of hours each month. We can back up to January 1, 2024.

I know this is a lot to ask. Another important reason for turning in our hours is to show the influence of ECRW. When our organization turns in thousands of hours a month, it proves how much time and effort Ector County members contribute to promoting the Republican Party philosophy and purpose. Please help our club in this endeavor.

Just How Red is Texas?



- Yep, Texas is number 23 out of 50 states. SAD!!!!! Arizona and Nevada, one reliably red, have become two of the country's prime presidential battlegrounds for 2024 elections. In 2020, Joe Biden lost in Texas by 5 percentage points. It was the best showing by a Democratic presidential candidate in nearly a quarter century. Some say the reason George Soros continues to pour millions of dollars into Texas is he will not stop until he turns Texas blue. Soros' new PAC has raised \$2.25 million through last year. Working with the PAC, Soros made a six-figure donation to three county parties - Dallas, Cameron, and Hidalgo - and a few other groups that have a regional focus. The contributions are intended to help the entities register, contact, and turn out voters, on a scale never seen before. West Texas over the last two decades has become Democrats' political promised land.

Remembering the Alamo: A Call to Action at the Ballot Box

As we stand ready for another crucial election, it's imperative to reflect on the sacrifices made by those who came before us. This month is one steeped in historical significance for Texas and serves as a poignant reminder of our state's enduring spirit.

In short, this law has made it easier to vote and harder to cheat. As a result, elections in Texas have never been more secure.

As your state representative, I urge you to remember the Alamo and let your voice be heard at the ballot box during this primary election. Together, we can ensure that the spirit of independence and freedom that inspired the heroes of the Alamo continues to live on here in modern-day Texas.



TikTok Must Break Up With the Chinese Communist Party

This week the U.S. House of Representatives passed H.R. 7521, *the Protecting Americans' Data and National Security against Foreign Adversaries Act*. This legislation would require the popular video app TikTok to divest, or separate from, its Chinese-owned parent company ByteDance.

TikTok is fully owned and controlled by the Chinese Communist Party (CCP). Our legislation requires TikTok to sever ties with its Chinese partners to protect the privacy and safety of American citizens. Additionally, TikTok boasts more than 170 million American users, making it a valuable propaganda tool for the CCP. We cannot allow our country's biggest adversary to spy on American citizens through their phones and promote or suppress information. I am proud to have voted to protect the privacy of Americans and fully counter the CCP on our own soil.

Non-Citizens Should Not Be Election Administrators

I introduced *the No Foreign Persons Administering Our Elections Act*, which prohibits noncitizens from serving as election administrators for U.S. federal elections. Unfortunately, this is already happening. Just last month, a Chinese national was sworn in to serve on the San Francisco Election Commission.

American elections are the cornerstone of our democracy, and entrusting their administration to noncitizens undermines the very essence of our nation's sovereignty. 
We Must Protect U.S. Elections at All Costs


