Righteousness Exalts a Nation

Whether or not America will prosper into the future depends on its righteous ness today. But how is national righteousness measured? Dozens of Bible passages (Deuteronomy 28; 1 Kings 18; 1 Chronicles 21) affirm that the righteousness of any nation is defined by its public policies and how well they conform to God's standards. As Samuel Adams affirmed, only God-honoring policies can exalt a nation:

[Divine] revelation assures us that "Righteousness exalteth a nation." Communities are dealt with in this world by the wise and just Ruler of the Universe. He rewards or punishes them according to their general character.³

Across the pages of American history, this verse has been regularly cited by both political and religious leaders. For example, Frederick Douglass, a minister of the Gospel who also served as a political leader long before and after the Civil War, told citizens:

I have one great political idea.... That idea is an old one. It is widely and generally assented to; nevertheless, it is very generally trampled upon and disregarded. The best expression of it, I have found in the Bible. It is in substance, "Righteousness exalteth a nation; sin is a reproach to any people." Sir, this constitutes my politics—the negative and positive of my politics, and the whole of my politics.... I feel it my duty to do all in my power to infuse this idea into the public mind, that it may speedily be recognized and practiced upon by our people.4

Third Quarter TFRW Board Meeting Update

The third quarter board meeting was on July 15th and 16th at the Georgetown Sheraton Hotel and Convention Center. This was an exceptionally large and well attended board meeting with important updates.

Membership is always one of the key points and retention of membership is a concern in both the local clubs. Both Midland and Odessa clubs have not met their membership goals in last two years. We are hoping the PANDEMIC was cause of the decrease and no other reasons. TFRW is available to help clubs and District Directors have lots of information to share so use the resources. If your club needs help with TEC reports or Bylaws your District Director can be of assistance.

The TFRW website has many updated forms including the Achievement Awards. The new Achievement award form mirrors the NFRW excel worksheet in the monthly worksheet and Awards Form. One of the new forms is for the President to use in notifying TFRW of a deceased member. The only two still not updated are Caring for America and the Top 10 award.

Melanie Grammar is the new VP of Membership after Dana Myers resigned due to becoming Vice Chair of Texas Republican Party. Dana will remain on the TFRW board, and we are excited to see all she accomplishes in her new position.

District Directors will be collaborating with clubs to set up a Nuts & Bolts conference in early 2023. This entails planning and organization so will be asking the clubs for assistance. This will give local club members an opportunity to be a part of training and mentoring of new members to teach what we are all about. February 3rd is TFRW Legislative Day in Austin and needs to be on the calendars for 2023 officers and board members. September 17th is the "Tribute to Women" event honoring local clubs' members. This will be at the Georgetown Sheraton & Convention Center and August 15th is deadline to submit bios and headshot photos of the honorees.

The TFRW Caring for America award forms are waiting for approval from the NFRW board A new project for all clubs to participate in as Caring for America is RESTORE. This is a Food Pantry project with ideas to use in your local clubs. Billboards was an election strategy that Waco Republican took on a project. It is an expensive project for clubs and takes detailed planning. TFRW is going to try and use part of the VEP funds to do this type of Billboard Campaigning in high population areas like Austin, Dallas, and Houston.

Supreme Court Judge Jane Bland is Judicial Liaison and noted that 3 Texas Supreme Court Judges are on the November 8th ballot with Democratic opponents. These 3 Republican Judges that need our support are Debra Lehrmann, Evan Young and Rebecca Huddle. Down ballot voting is so important. The Appointments Chair is Sheila Faske, and she is contract for anyone interested in a state committee chair position. Governor Abbott appoints 1500 chairs each year in everything from Funeral Board to State Board of Education and 911 Commission. Anyone can apply by going to the state website completing application and submitting with headshot photo.

The Odessa Police Department has sent four officers to Uvalde to help out following the May 24 shooting that took the lives of 19 students and two teachers at Robb El-ementary School. Another 17 people were injured in the incident. "The Odessa Police

Department understands the increased demands on

police resources following mass shootings like the one that recently occurred in Uvalde," a department spokesman wrote in an email.

The officers will "assist their local law enforce-ment agencies with additional patrols and security details. Our hearts and prayers go out to all those affected by this sense-less tragedy," Cpl. Steven LeSueur wrote.



Cheesesteak Eggrolls

Ingredients

1 pound minced meat
1 tsp Worcestershire sauce
Half a tsp salt
Half teaspoon ground black pepper
2 tablespoons butter
1 yellow onion chopped
½ chopped green pepper
24 egg rolls
12 slices of American cheese
cup vegetable oil for frying
Methods



Step 1

Heat fry pan on heat. Cook beef, trimming as little as possible, until browned and still about the size of a pea, 5 to 7 minutes. Adding Worcestershire sauce, salt / pepper. Gently stir, then remove the mixture from the skillet.

Step 2

Melt the butter in the skillet. Add onions and peppers. Cook, stirring, until browned, 5 to 7 minutes. Return beef mixture to skillet and stir to combine. Let the filling cool while preparing the wrappers.

Step 3

Lay the egg roll wrappers on a flat surface. Put half a slice of American cheese on each. Add 3 tablespoons of the filling on top of each egg roll. Pull the lower left corner over the filling and fold the sides, wetting the edges with water as you go; roll tightly.

Step 4

Heat about 1 inch of oil in a large saucepan over medium-high heat. Add 3 to 4 egg rolls at a time and fry until browned, 3 to 4 minutes. Repeat the process with the rest of the egg rolls.

News Releases

The City of Odessa received its August sales tax check, in the amount of, \$5,656,553.25.

This amount includes the Economic Development sales tax of ½ cent. The City of Odessa will receive \$4,525,242.60 and the Odessa Development Corporation will receive \$1,131,310.65.

The City saw an increase in sales tax revenue with August's sales tax revenue total of \$4,525,242.60 which reflects a \$204,484.12, or 4.73% as compared to August 2021.

The year-to-date total sales tax revenue for fiscal year 2021-22 is up 28.73%, or \$9,853,878.48 as compared to budgeted amount expected at this point in the fiscal year. In addition, the 2021-22 year-to-date amount is above the previous fiscal year-to-date amount by \$6,388,316.18 or 16.92%.

The City has budgeted \$37,500,000.00 in net sales tax revenues for this current fiscal year. Sales tax revenue is generated by sales tax revenue from two months prior to collection, i.e., August's collection is based on June sales.

This includes handling legislative, legal, regulatory, and public relations matters.

Beyond his professional life, Stephen is active in the community through civic and charitable organizations. He volunteers with Upward Basketball, has served on the board of directors for Centers for Children and Families and the Midland Chapter of the Texas Exes, and currently serves on the board or as a member of the Texas Tech University School of Law Energy Law Advisory Council, TxDOT's Permian Basin Freight Plan Advisory Committee, the Midland College Bruno Hanson Environmental Excellence Advisory Committee, the MOTRAN Alliance, the Midland County Public Library Foundation and the Phyllis and Bob Cowan Performing Arts Series Advisory Committee. He was also named one of Midland Magazine's 20 under 40 emerging leaders, and is a member of the board of directors of the Texas Lyceum, a stewardship association focused on developing the next generation of leaders across Texas.

Kit Whitehill is the 2022-2023 TFRW President. She previously served as the 1st Vice President-Special Events, the Community Engagement Chair, and the 2017 TFRW Convention Chair. Since 2004, James has served as a Commissioner for the State Commission on Emergency Communications overseeing our state's 9-1-1 and Poison Control programs.
