Sheriff Mike Griffis

was born and raised in Odessa, attended Permian, and in 1988 enrolled in the



Odessa College Law Enforcement Academy. Mike became a licensed peace officer in May 1989, and was commissioned by the Ector County Sheriff's Office as a volunteer Reserve Deputy under Sheriff Bob

Brookshire. He was elected as Constable of precinct 1 and served from January 1, 1993 until May 1995 at which time he returned full time to the Sheriff's Office. He rose thru the ranks to 3rd in command in October 2015. Mike ran for Sheriff in 2016, winning the election in the primary and became Sheriff January 1, 2017, and currently in his 2nd term as Sheriff.

In December 2019, Sheriff Griffis was appointed by Gov. Gregg Abbott to the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement. He is a board member of, The Salvation Army, Project Lifesaver, Ector County Child Services Board, and The United Way. He is a member of The Sheriff's Association of Texas, National Sheriff's Association, The Big Bend Area Law Enforcement Association, and a member of the Odessa Rotary Club, and former board member of the Permian Basin Law Enforcement Academy. He is married to his beautiful wife Allison. Between them, they have two sons and three daughters, 6 grand boys, and a granddaughter.

Sheriff Thaddeus Cleveland of Terrell

County, Texas. He was first appointed as Sheriff on May 17, 2022 and later elected into office. Sheriff Cleveland spent just over 26 years in the United States Border Patrol and the last 11 years of his career as the Patrol Agent in Charge of the Sanderson Border Patrol Station.



Sheriff Cleveland entered on duty with the U.S. Border Patrol on February 26, 1996, as a member of Class 300. His first duty assignment as a Border Patrol agent was at the Nogales Border Patrol Station in the Tucson Sector. Since his entry into the U.S. Border Patrol, Sheriff Cleveland served as a Border Patrol Agent at Sierra Blanca, Texas, a Senior Patrol Agent at Eagle Pass, Texas, a Supervisory Border Patrol Agent at Douglas, Arizona and Artesia, New Mexico. He has also served as a Field Operations Supervisor at Naco, Arizona and Alpine, Texas. Sheriff Cleveland served as an Assistant Chief in Washington, D.C. at the Office of Border Patrol as well as U.S. Customs and Border Protection Commissioner's Office of Anti-Terrorism and Office of State, Local and Tribal Liaison.

Sheriff Cleveland served six months alongside the Texas Department of Public Safety in Austin, Texas as the Border Patrol Staff Officer at the Texas Homeland Security Border Security Operations Center (BSOC). As the Staff Officer, he served as the single point of contact between the BSOC, the Border Patrol Sectors and the Office of Border Patrol in Washington, D.C.

Sheriff Cleveland also served as the U.S. Customs and Border Protection (CBP) Advisor to U.S. Army North (ARNORTH) in support of the Department of Defense's (DoD) assistance to the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) for the Humanitarian Crisis at the Southwest Border with Mexico. Sheriff Cleveland synchronized DHS' requests for assistance to the Humanitarian Crisis and guided the operationalization of DoD plans to support CBP.

Prior to joining the Border Patrol, Sheriff Cleveland served in the U.S. Air Force!

Primary Elections 2024

Campaigns are in full swing for the March 5th Primary Elections. Being a presidential election year puts everything in high gear on campaigns. Nationally there are many key races with the retirement of Debbie Stabenow of Wisconsin, and Joe Manchin of West Virginia who are both Democrats senators. The other key Democrat Senate seats are Kyrsten Sinema of Arizona, Tammy Balwin of Wisconsin, Sherrod Brown of Ohio, Bob Casey of Pennsylvania, John Tester of Montana and Jacky Rosen of Nevada. A key special election is in New York District 3 to replace George Santos in the U S House with Republican Mazi Melesa Philip, an Ethiopian born mother of 7 who fought in the Israel Defense Force before migrating to the United States She is in a very tight race with Democrat opponent. Mazi is a focus candidate for National Federation of Republican Women in Politics.

In Texas, February 5th is the last day to register to vote in the March primary! Early voting starts February 20th and ends March 1st. February 23rd is the last day for a Ballot by Mail requests. ***March 5th is election day.***

In Texas we have 1 senate race for Ted Cruz seat with 2 Republican opponents Holland” Redd” Gibson & Rufus Lopez. On the Democrat side there are 9 candidates but the main one is Colin Allred a 3-term US House Representative out of Dallas and is a former NFL player. Soros has fund Allred heavily.

Railroad Commissioner Christy Craddock has 5 Republican challengers. While there are 15 Texas Senate positions up in this election, Kevin Sparks does not have to run till 2026. Both August Pfluger HD 11 and Brooks Landgraf Tx House Dist. 81 are unopposed. Tom Craddick in Midland HD 82 has a democrat opponent.

There are 7 State Board of Education seats including our Aaron Kinsley in District 15 who has a democrat opponent Morgan Kirkpatrick. The Texas Supreme Court has 3 judges up for election, Jimmy Blacklock Place 1, John Devine Place 4 is challenged by democrat Brian Walker. Jane Bland in Place 6 has 2 democrat opponents. On the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals there are 3 positions on the ballot. Chief Justice Sharon Keller is opposed by Republican David J Schenck, Barbara Parker Hervey Place 7 has opponent Democrat Gina Parker. Michelle Slaughter in Place 8 has democrat opponent Lee Finley. Several of these Court of Criminal Appeals Judges have visited our ECRW meetings and need our support.

Locally in Ector County we have several unopposed races including Julie Prentice for County Attorney, Sheriff Mike Griffis and Lindy Wright for Tax Collector/Assessor.

The races with multiple candidates include:

Commissioner Precinct 1 Mike Gardner (incumbent) challenged by Linda Young Anglley, Larry Glenn Robinson, and David Shaw.

Commissioner Precinct 3 Don Stringer(incumbent) challenged by Samatha Russell.

Justice of Peace Precinct 1 Carlos Chavez(incumbent) challenged by Steve Brennan & Jennifer Mahan Woodall.

The Ector County Republican Party Chair and Precinct Chairs is a big race with ECRW president, Donna Kelm challenging Incumbent Tisha Crow.

Yep, Texas is number 23 out of 50 states. SAD!!!! Arizona and Nevada, one reliably red, have become two of the country’s prime presidential battlegrounds for 2024 elections. In 2020, Joe Biden lost in Texas by 5 percentage points. It was the best showing by a Democratic presidential candidate in nearly a quarter century. 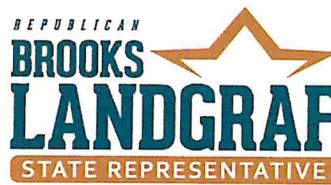

Dr. Fu's great testimony detailed how the CCP's repression of religious freedom, human rights, and the rule of law in China has reached catastrophic levels. I was honored to hear his story and be able to bring this issue to the attention of my colleagues. The work of Dr. Fu and China Aid is bringing to light the horrors of the CCP and its reach on American soil. May we all admire the courage of Dr. Fu for testifying and representing Texas-11 in Washington.

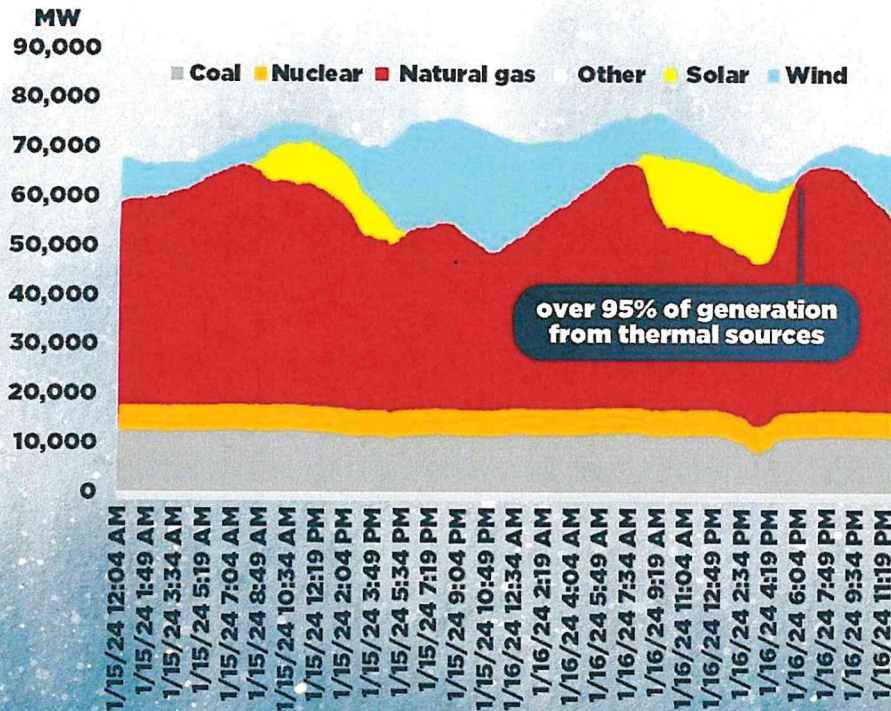


The Best of the Above

Dimensions of the artwork can be no larger than 26 inches high, 26 inches wide, and 4 inches deep. Accepted mediums for the two-dimensional artwork are as follows:

- Paintings: oil, acrylics, watercolor, etc.
- Drawings: colored pencil, pencil, ink, marker, pastels, charcoal (It is recommended that charcoal and pastel drawings be fixed.)
- Collages: must be two dimensional
- Prints: lithographs, silkscreen, block prints
- Mixed Media: use of more than two mediums such as pencil, ink, watercolor, etc.
- Computer-generated art
- Photographs


